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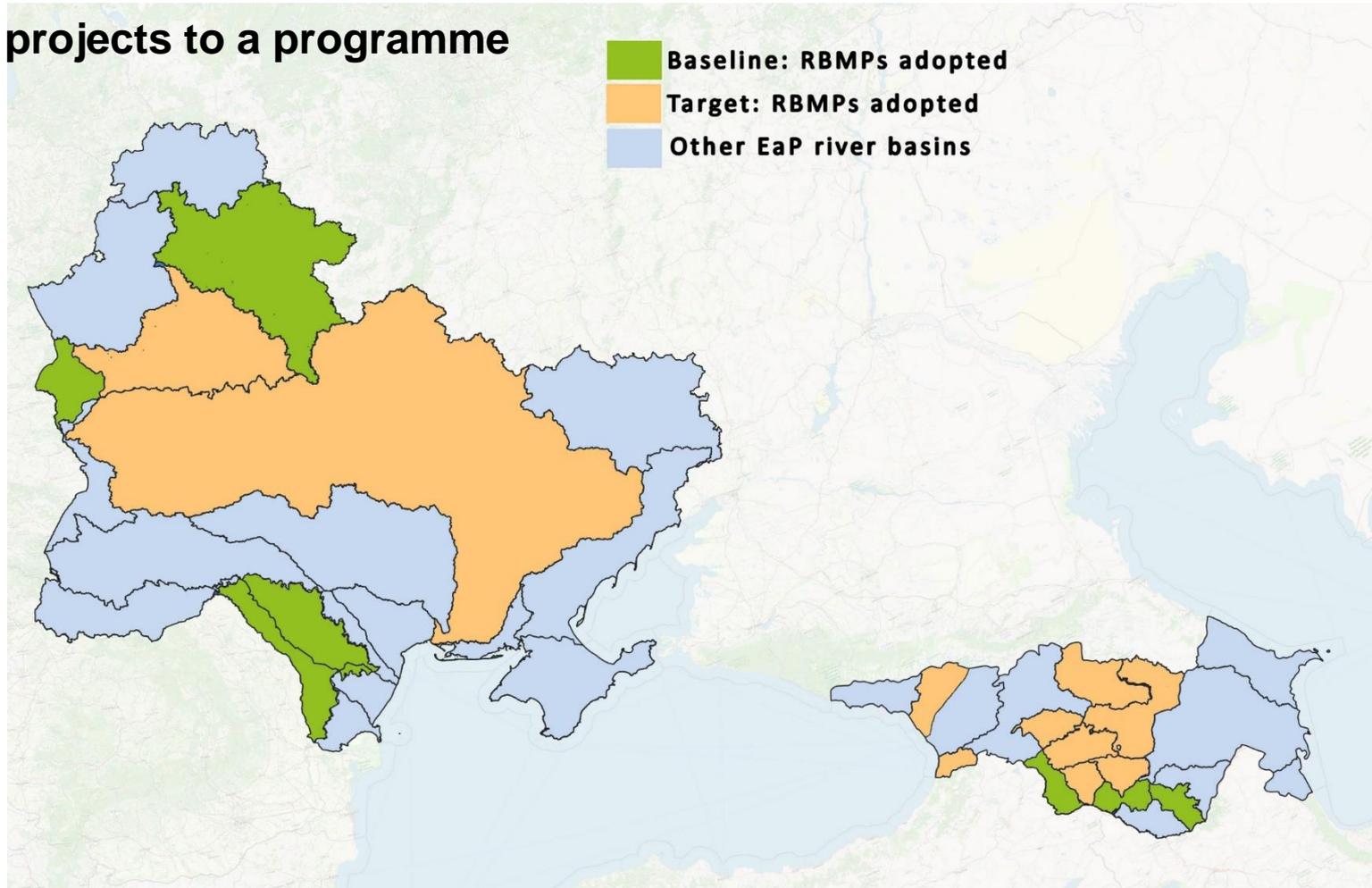

Focus areas include:</p> <p><u>Armenia</u> - reform of water abstraction fees, including application in hydropower sector, maximising impact of polluter pays principle, review of irrigation service fees and subsidies</p> <p><u>Azerbaijan</u> – use of economic instruments to incentivise water use efficiency, including in agriculture, consideration of the opportunities for differentiated tariffs recognising regional scarcity of water</p> <p><u>Georgia</u> - implementation of recommendations on the reform of water abstraction fees consider ongoing work on a new irrigation tariff, work on changing tariff structures with a focus on affordability</p> <p><u>Moldova</u> - development of a methodology on setting and revision of the water tax</p> <p><u>Ukraine</u> - opportunities for reform of water tariffs and subsidies to support river basin management plan implementation and financing, strengthening the role of River Basin Management Organisations and opportunities for earmarking sector revenues and the potential for a revolving fund.</p>

<p>Agreed activities</p>	<p>A roadmap to indicate barriers to and opportunities for improved mobilisation of finance from bilateral and multilateral institutions and consideration of domestic/private-sector finance.</p> <p>Roadmap will consider opportunities for funding of programmes of measures of RBMPs, possible role for and financing of nature-based solutions, and opportunities for embedding new technologies and innovative solutions to improve costing of schemes.</p> <p>Work on nature based solutions will look to leverage experience from the recent EU instrument for financing nature - Natural Capital Financing Facility (NCFF).</p> <p>Links to the OECD's Roundtable on Water Financing will be established.</p>

Organising trainings on data mapping and working with satellite images.</p> <p>Helpdesk to discuss setting up the CLC mapping project, use of the dedicated software tool, clarifying photointerpretation questions, etc.</p> <p>Support the country in preparation of a request to EC on the extension of High-Resolution Layers (HRL) In case of HRL extension, Implementation of a pilot project with a team of experts from the countries on the interpretation of HRL data.</p>
